Hello everyone

Please allow me to respond to this letter as it doesn't seem to be a VIHA issue but rather a BCEHS issue, and I do apologize for the delay in my reply.

I looked into what occurred on our dispatch end and indeed some incorrect information did make its way to Fire Dispatch which led to the Duty Officer being contacted 5 minutes before our BCEHS crew.

I would like to address the idea that after hours an ambulance is dispatched from another community and I have previously joined a zoom meeting with some members of council to explain how the current deployment model works. The reality is that the ambulance will continue to operate in pretty much the same fashion as it has in the past with members on pager responding from whatever they are doing in the community.

There are two main differences,

- -one of the employees on the day shift is on shift at the station for 8 hours (8-4) Monday to Thursday one week and Monday to Wednesday the next, this is known as a Scheduled On Call (SOC) shift. This same employee is also on call for the night shift portion of those days and this pattern continues throughout the year.
- -any low acuity transfers that originate from the clinic on those SOC shifts outside of the hours of 8-4 will preferentially be done by a different ambulance thus keeping the Port Alice unit available to Port Alice.

There are of course many factors that weigh into each event and the decisions are made with the perspective of what is best for the patient given all the resources available to the Tri-Port area at that time.

I trust this addresses the concerns brought up and I am certainly available if clarification is needed or there are further questions.

Good Day Ladies & Gentlemen,

We write to you today with a plea for the survival of our once world renowned B.C. Ambulance Service. You are the peoples voice. Please... encourage our Provincial Government to put the B.C. Ambulance Service back in the hands of Emergency Health Services Commission under the Ministry of Health. The provision of emergency medical services is the responsibility of the Provincial government. Your tax payers should not be burdened with supplementing their failures.

The BCAS 10-7 Association Society is a group of 274 retired BC Ambulance Service professionals. Our membership is comprised of trailblazers in BC's Emergency Medical Services including Paramedics, Managers, Emergency Dispatchers and Support Staff. Our years of experience and broad understanding of BC Ambulance Service mandate and history make us subject matter experts in the complex field of pre-hospital care and emergency management in BC. We have watched with concern over the past weeks, months and years as the BC Ambulance Service has been neglected and mismanaged to the point of imminent failure and are compelled to speak out today.

The BC Ambulance Service was established in 1974 to provide comprehensive and effective emergency medical services for all residents of British Columbia. Through dedicated first responders and effective leadership BCAS became a world-renowned emergency service, emulated by many both within Canada and abroad. It is distressing to witness the degradation of the service that we were a part of building and once proud of. It is important to note that the service breakdown that unfolded over the course of the recent heatwave did not suddenly happen over the past week. There has been a systematic dismantling of BCAS starting in 2010 with the removal of the Emergency Health Services Commission, an arm's length branch of the Ministry of Health.

The government placed the service under the umbrella of the Provincial Health Services Authority, an organization with no experience in pre-hospital emergency services. The entire operational structure was dismantled, and the experienced Operational Managers and leaders were replaced with health care administrators. The costs of these so called "labour adjustments" soared into hundreds of thousands of dollars in severance and legal costs. The loss of operational expertise was immeasurable. Following these "adjustments" the number of non-operational staff skyrocketed as much as 10-fold, while the workload of emergency responders was stretched beyond capacity. The physical and mental health of Paramedics and Dispatchers plummeted yet the senior administrative staff appeared to be more focused

on "changing the culture" of proud Paramedics rather than advancing a strong, resilient, and cost-effective emergency service for the citizens of BC.

We have watched our colleagues suffer through these ill-conceived, damaging changes. The unimaginably long waits for service and negative patient outcomes as a result of a poorly managed system are inexcusable. We say enough is enough. The citizens of BC deserve better. The hard-working, caring, and dedicated Paramedics and Dispatchers deserve better. We call on the Minister of Health to take immediate action and restore the BC Ambulance Service to the efficient provincial service that it was designed to be. Provide adequate funding and support to attract and retain talented paramedics and dispatchers. Consult with the expertise within the ranks of BCAS to identify deficiencies and solutions. Trim the unnecessary and costly non-operational staff and redirect those funds back to front line care. And above all, show respect and compassion to your front-line workers who have endured years of neglect through dysfunctional decision making by unqualified leaders in senior management. The BCAS 10-7 Association/Society offers our support in finding solutions to secure a healthy future for the BC Ambulance Service, the Paramedics and Dispatchers who proudly serve, and the people of British Columbia.

Dear Mayor Dugas and Co-signers:

Thank you for your letter of March 3, 2021, regarding emergency fire equipment and facilities funding for small rural communities. We apologize for the delay in responding.

First responders, including firefighters, make valuable contributions to communities throughout BC, and the Province of British Columbia recognizes and appreciates the challenges that small municipalities and rural communities within regional districts face in delivering fire and rescue services. The purpose of this letter is to respond directly to your request that the Province consider dedicating a portion of the insurance premium tax to local governments and to provide information on how the Province supports local government fire protection and road rescue services.

The Province relies on taxation revenue to fund the public services we all benefit from, including health, education and social services. In general, revenues generated from taxes, including revenues from the insurance premium tax, are directed into the Consolidated Revenue Fund, which provides government with the greatest flexibility to respond to BC's needs. The government does not generally dedicate revenues to specific programs. This is because revenue rarely aligns with program spending requirements and tend to constrain government's ability to adjust spending priorities as circumstances change.

The Province appreciates the importance of appropriately trained and equipped fire services throughout BC. As you know, the Community Charter provides municipalities with broad authority for long-term financial planning and independence to set their own tax rates necessary to sustainably fund core services like fire protection. We understand that local governments must balance the costs of adequate fire protection with the benefits of reduced risk to life and property and reduced property insurance rates, and we recognize that changing standards and regulations, while increasing the safety and protection of firefighters and first responders, also come at a cost which can result in increased property tax requisitions.

In addition to core service funding that local governments provide, we note that the Province has provided a number of funding programs that local governments have been able to access to support a wide variety of fire protection and road rescue services:

- In December 2020, the Office of the Fire Commissioner partnered with the Fire Chiefs' Association of BC (FCABC) to launch the Road Rescue Grant program. Under this grant, BC fire organizations were able to apply for up to \$50,000 to fund equipment or train emergency responders in road rescue.
- In late 2020 and early 2021, the Ministry of Municipal Affairs provided \$425 million in direct grants to local governments under the COVID-19 Safe Restart Grant. Included in the eligible use of these funds is additional cost of protective services (such as fire protection) to deal with direct and indirect community impacts from the COVID-19 pandemic.
- On December 1, 2020, the federal and provincial governments committed up to \$80.29 million towards the intake of Canada Infrastructure Program COVID-19 Resilience Infrastructure Stream (CVRIS) to support cost-sharing of infrastructure projects in communities across the province. Among other benefits, CVRIS supported projects that provide retrofits, repairs, and upgrades to local government and Indigenous government buildings, including fire halls.
- In May 2019, the Province provided \$5 million to the UBCM Community Emergency Preparedness Fund to develop a stream of funding for volunteer and composite fire departments to facilitate the delivery of firefighter training and to purchase new or replacement equipment.

If your fire department provides services outside your municipal boundaries, there may be an opportunity to establish a "fire protection contribution service" in co-operation with the regional district, which would provide a source of rural revenue to fund your fire department.

In closing, we note that many organizations continue to collaborate on funding and training initiatives that can assist fire departments and local authorities that have fewer resources. For example, Emergency Management BC and the Office of the Fire Commissioner continue to work collaboratively with Union of BC Municipalities, the Local Government Management Association, BC Wildfire Service, and the Fire Chiefs' Association of BC.

Your feedback is appreciated, and we will continue to take it into consideration. Thank you again for writing.

Further to our letter of January 2021, we are writing to let you know about exciting new developments with the <u>British Columbia Social Procurement Initiative (BCSPI)</u>.

Previously only available to governments in the Vancouver Island and Coastal Communities region, BCSPI has recently received support from the BC Government to expand province-wide, providing the opportunity for governments and institutional purchasers in communities across British Columbia to join.

BCSPI is a low cost, high value program that provides local governments with the training, expertise, and support they need to integrate social procurement practices and add social value to their existing purchasing. For an annual membership fee equivalent to local area of government association dues, participating local governments get access to a full suite of professional development and training, templates, case studies, impact measurement tools and expert consultation support at no additional cost.

Significantly, now is the best possible time to join. Building on the successes of the first two years, new members will join with all of the foundational work in place: over 50 pilot projects undertaken, a comprehensive library of templates and tools developed, best practice examples and thriving community of practice all available to support social procurement implementation.

BCSPI (formerly CCSPI) started as a two-year pilot in the Vancouver Island and Coastal Communities region in 2019 and, since its inception, has already grown in membership from 6 to 30 local governments and institutional purchasers. BCSPI members have now procured over \$200 million of goods, services and construction with added social value to the benefit of their local economies. This means that additional local business, employment and skills & training opportunities are being generated from existing procurement dollars at a time when our local economies need it most. Renewal of the Municipal and Regional District Tax (MRDT)

The RDMW requires a letter of support from the Village of Port Alice Council for their application to the Province to renew the MRDT. The tax was formerly known as the Additional Hotel Room Tax (AHRT) but has been renamed by the Province and is now known as the Municipal Regional District Tax or the MRDT for short. Originally implemented in 2009, the additional 2% tax is charged on all hotel rooms in the region, including those within the municipalities of Port McNeill, Port Hardy and Alert Bay. A portion of the revenue collected is used to support the Vancouver Island North Tourism organisation for the purpose of tourism marketing and the remainder is used to support tourism-related projects. The Village of Port Alice has accessed funding for website improvements, a tourism brochure and signage in past years.

Monday, June 14, 2021, Vancouver Island, BC – For the second year in a row, Vancouver Island Regional Library (VIRL) has been awarded an American Library Association (ALA) Presidential Citation for Innovative International Library Projects. This year, staff will receive this prestigious award for the VIRL Connects initiative, a program staff from all across VIRL's service area supported to help community members most in need.

"VIRL Connects was touched by all corners of our service area, from the local staff who provided one-to-one assistance for each facility, to our teams working in information technology, library collections and procurement, and with support from VIRL's Leadership and Executive Leadership Group," said Anne O'Shea, VIRL's Deputy Executive Director. "It's exciting to see VIRL's role in the broader community evolving, and this was a happy marriage between VIRL's digital content, technology expertise, and commitment to serving people when and where they need it during a crisis like the pandemic."

Since its launch in 2020, VIRL Connects has provided digital care packages to people in care homes and other facilities in our service area to combat social isolation and foster increased digital literacy.

The range of services and technologies in the digital care packages include:

- Chromebooks: simple to use laptops that provide access to important cloud-based apps
- Chromecasts: devices that allow Smart TVs to cast the screens of tablets and smartphones
- Smart TVs: flat screen TVs with internet access and the ability to cast from other devices
- Support: from library staff to set up digital care packages, connect to library services and learn about the hundreds of thousands of eBooks, audiobooks, TV shows, movies, and classes available online through virl.bc.ca.

All told, VIRL provided laptops, streaming devices, TVs and personalized assistance to benefit close to 2,000 vulnerable residents through 27 community organizations. VIRL Connects was made possible thanks to a series of grants from Community Foundations across VIRL's service area. The funding is part of the Government of Canada's Emergency Community Support Fund, totalling \$350 million nationwide.

Initial funding was provided by:

- Gwaii Trust
- Nanaimo Foundation
- Parksville Qualicum Community Foundation

Additional funding was also provided by the Victoria Foundation and the program is still being rolled out in Sooke and Sidney.

VIRL will receive the award in the coming weeks and an article will be published in the July issue of American Libraries magazine.

In 2020, VIRL received an ALA Award for its Indigenous Voices Program.
